From the Desk of Dr. Saundra Johnson Austin, President "Black History is American History"

The first Saturday in February I happened to be watching MSNBC with Velshi. On his show he was celebrating Black History Month by interviewing his guest Nikole Hannah-Jones, journalist at *The New York Times* and 2020 Pulitzer Prize winner in the commentary cate-

gory for her provocative and groundbreaking 1619 project. Her personal essay places the enslavement of Africans at the center of America's story. In fact, during the interview, she stated that, "Black history is American history." The 1619 Project begins with stating, "in August of 1619, a ship appeared on this horizon, near Point Comfort, a coastal port in the English colony of Virginia. It carried more than 20 enslaved Africans, who were sold to the colonists. No aspect of the country that would be formed here has been untouched by the years of slavery that followed. On the 400th anniversary of this fateful moment, it is finally time to tell our story truthfully." There was a second ship that sailed just a year later called the Mayflower that was the advent of American freedom, then the White Lion was the advent of American slavery. "One ship and its people have been immortalized, the other completely erased." The New York Times Magazine published The 1619 Project to inform us that August 1619 is the year of our nation's birth instead of 1776 when the Declaration of Independence was approved and when "all men were created equal" and "endowed by their creator with uncertain unalienable rights." This reframing of our country's history places the consequences of slavery and contributions of Black Americans at the very center of the United States' national narrative. "Our democracy's founding ideals were false when they were written. Black Americans have fought to make them true." I am sharing this truth with you because I personally have never read this in our history books in school. There is one thing that I can conclude, and that is, I am the hopes and dreams of my ancestors. For more on our history, consider reading the book by author Nikole Hannah-Jones, Four Hundred Souls, A Community History of African America, 1619-2019. She recalls life in St. Paul, Minneapolis where the chapter owned the house. The house had formerly been the Governor's mansion. The mansion offered many meeting rooms for workshops. There was a special children's room where the children of members and guests were cared for. The chapter also offered pre-school reading and other activities for children under the age of six. Activities carried over to their annual Christmas party to which pre-schoolers were invited. Santa always came and delivered gifts to the children. Santa also encouraged a Christmas sing along.

Avis is a career Elementary Education educator. She worked with elementary aged students with Specific Learning Disabilities. She is now retired. In addition to her commitments with AAUW Tampa, Avis volunteers at a local hospital. She keeps this commitment even through the COVID 19 pandemic. Avis continues to learn and grow. Her newest endeavor is learning to play the Acoustic Guitar. We offer an open invitation for her to share her developing talent with us.

Through the years with AAUW, Avis has enjoyed the company of like-minded college educated women. She has grown because of intellectually stimulating programs. She has had the opportunity to look at other academic fields. In years past, AAUW chapters focused on individual growth and education. Members participated in book studies, language classes, educational study groups, and travel. Avis has been with AAUW Tampa since 1980 and has served as AAUW Tampa - Membership Chairperson and as Corresponding Secretary. She currently works on the scholarship committee. Mr. Clarence Fort

Mr. Fort was one of the original people associated with integrating the lunch counters in Tampa, Florida. Mr. Fort was a man who became the first of many opportunities that opened the doors for many of the Black population in the Tampa Bay area. Mr. Fort was a 21 year old president of the Tampa chapter of the NAACP when he organized students from Middleton and Blake high school to desegregate the lunch counter at Woolworth. Later, he became the first Black bus driver for Trailways bus line and was instrumental in getting more Black drivers for the company. Further information on Mr. Clarence Fort can be found on the internet. His story has been profiled at USF community history archives and numerous newspapers locally and nationally.
