AAUW Tampa President's Message for June 2022

Dear AAUW Tampa Members,

This is a bittersweet moment as this is my last issue in the *Tiempo* as President of AAUW Tampa, Inc. Before I go, I leave you with my recent experience at the National Museum of African American History and Culture in Washington, DC. I only had a few hours at the end of the conference I attended for the Women in Engineering Program Advocacy Network (WEPAN) before my flight back to Tampa.

People of every age, race, gender, and ethnicity were visiting the museum to experience decades of history of the African American culture. It was wonderful to see grandparents being wheeled through exhibits, African American girls taking selfies with Chuck Berry's bright red convertible, and White students learning how to mix rap music via one of the many interactive displays throughout the museum.

Of all the exhibits that I experienced, there was one titled, *The Value of Education* that resonated with me the most. Why? Because it reminded me of the vision and mission of AAUW. It read,

Whether enslaved or free, of limited means or privileged backgrounds, African American –like so many Americans–**viewed education as the key to changing their status**. Communities banded together to build and support schools, and parents sacrificed to send their children far from home. Despite various obstacles, African American's quest for education–from basics to higher intellectual pursuits–established a lasting legacy of achievement (Howard University classroom, ca. 1930s).

At AAUW, we are changing the status of women and girls by supporting their education. We do so by getting them excited about science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) and awarding scholarships to undergraduate and graduate women. I hope that we never lose sight of how important it is for more women and girls to further their education, if they choose, especially women and girls of color. Just as we were afforded the freedom and right to earn our degrees, we are paving the way for others to achieve their academic and career goals with our support.

Please join me in welcoming the incoming board. PUBLIC POLICY CORNER ...

Pass the FAMILY Act

Unlike the majority of developed countries worldwide, the United States does not guarantee paid annual leave, paid time off for illness or family care, or paid parental leave. And for many Americans, this unpaid time off work is untenable and it threatens their economic security. That's why AAUW is calling for passage of the Family and Medical Insurance Leave (FAMILY) Act, which would create a national self-funding paid family and medical leave insurance program. Call Our State Senator Marco Rubio.

Additionally, Florida Children are at high risk of losing coverage when the PHE ends

A recent <u>study</u> from Georgetown University's Center for Children and Families finds that Florida children are especially at risk of becoming uninsured after the PHE ends. This is due to multiple state policy decisions and program barriers in Florida's Medicaid and KidCare programs. The following barriers are specifically noted:

- lack of 12 months continuous Medicaid eligibility for children/youth;
- low rates of auto renewals;
- a child health insurance program (KidCare) that is separate from Medicaid; and
- premium charges for KidCare, including for families below 200 percent of the poverty level.

Florida already has the second <u>highest number of uninsured children in the country</u>, with Hispanic/Latino children 1.5 times more likely to be uninsured.<u>https://ccf.georgetown.edu/2022/02/17/governors-should-make-the-protection-of-children-and-families-from-health-coverage-loss-a-top-priority/?mc_cid=08433fe810&mc_eid=c097301a18</u>


MEMBERS IN THE NEWS...




