

The Why?

Closing the Gender Pay Gap: A Call to Action for Tampa AAUW Members

As members of the Tampa Florida Branch of AAUW, we are committed to advancing gender equity for women and girls through education, advocacy, and research. One of the most pressing issues facing women in our state today is the persistent gender pay gap. Despite progress in many areas, women in Florida continue to earn significantly less than their male counterparts, with far-reaching consequences for their economic security and overall well-being.

The Current Situation in Florida

Recent data shows that women working full-time in Florida still earn only 83 cents for every dollar earned by men. This disparity is even more pronounced for women of color, highlighting the intersectionality of gender and racial discrimination in the workplace. The gap has remained stubbornly stable over the past two decades, indicating that without concerted effort and policy changes, we may not see wage parity in our lifetimes.

Impact on Women's Lives

The gender pay gap affects more than just women's paychecks. It contributes to:

- Reduced lifetime earnings and retirement savings
- Higher rates of poverty among women, especially single mothers
- Limited educational and career advancement opportunities
- Increased financial stress and its associated health impacts

AAUW Florida's Stance

Our state organization, AAUW Florida, has identified achieving economic security for all women as one of its key public policy priorities. This aligns perfectly with our branch's focus on closing the gender pay gap. We believe that equal pay is not just a women's issue, but a family issue and a crucial component of economic justice.

What We Can Do

As Tampa AAUW members, it seems daunting to try and tackle this issue alone. I suggest we partner up with some local organizations to help advance reducing the gender pay gap.

Here's How We Could Do Something:

- 1. Collaborate with The Helen Gordon Davis Centre for Women:
 - This nonprofit organization in Tampa offers several programs that align with AAUW's mission:
 - Partner with their Tampa Bay Works for Women program to help women develop career plans and address employment barriers.
 - Work with their Women's Business Centre to support female entrepreneurs through business coaching, webinars, and training.
 - Collaborate on workshops or events focused on pay equity and negotiation skills.
- 2. Engage with the Tampa Bay Chamber of Commerce:
 - Connect with their Minority Empowerment Program (MEP) to support Black and Hispanic-owned businesses and nonprofits.
 - Propose joint events or workshops focused on pay equity and women's economic empowerment.
 - Offer AAUW's expertise on gender pay gap issues to complement their existing programs.
- 3. Partner with Equal Pay Today:
 - While not specifically Tampa-based, this national organization focuses on eradicating the gender wage gap.
 - Collaborate on local initiatives or awareness campaigns in Tampa, leveraging their strategies in policy reform, education, and outreach.

- 4. Work with the City of Tampa's Women/Minority Business Enterprise (WMBE) Program:
 - Offer support or resources to women-owned businesses participating in this program.
 - Propose workshops on pay equity and negotiation skills for women entrepreneurs.
- 5. Collaborate with the Women's Conference of Florida:
 - Participate in or co-sponsor sessions at their annual conference focused on pay equity issues.
 - Offer AAUW's expertise as speakers or panelists on gender pay gap topics.

To initiate these partnerships:

- 1. Reach out to the organizations' leadership or program coordinators.
- 2. Propose specific collaboration ideas that align with both AAUW's mission and the partner organization's goals.
- 3. Offer AAUW's resources, such as research on the gender pay gap or workshop materials on salary negotiation.
- 4. Suggest joint events, workshops, or awareness campaigns that combine the strengths of both organizations.
- 5. Consider forming a local coalition focused on pay equity, bringing together multiple organizations for greater impact.

By partnering with these local organizations, the Tampa Florida branch of AAUW can leverage combined resources and expertise to more effectively address the gender pay gap in the Tampa area.

The Data Behind the Wage Gap

Wage disparities are exacerbated by institutionalized and systemic biases against marginalized groups. Other Equal

Pay Days throughout the year include:


Black Women's Equal Pay Day: July 27—Black women working full-time, year-round are paid 67 cents and all earners (including part-time and seasonal) are paid 64 cents for every dollar paid to non-Hispanic white men.

Moms' Equal Pay Day: August 15. Moms working fulltime, year-round are paid 74 cents and all earners are paid 62 cents for every dollar paid to dads.

Latina's Equal Pay Day: October 5. Latinas women working full-time, year-round are paid 57 cents and all earners (including part-time and seasonal) are paid 54 cents for every dollar paid to non-Hispanic white men.

Native Women's Equal Pay Day: November 30. Native women working full-time, year-round are paid 57 cents and all earners (including part-time and seasonal) are paid 51 cents for every dollar paid to non-Hispanic white men.

Asian American, Native Hawaiian and Pacific



Islander Women's Equal Pay Day: is not yet determined. However, numbers show that Asian American, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander women working full-time, year-round are paid 92 cents and all earners (including part-time and seasonal) are paid 80 cents for every dollar paid to non-Hispanic white men.

LGBTQIA+ Equal Pay Awareness Day: June 15 – there isn't enough data to reliably make calculations, but the date falls halfway through Pride Month.

Public Policy Matters: Are You Ready to Vote?

There are thirty-five days remaining until Election Day, which falls on **Tuesday November 5, 2024.** Calculation is from October 1, 2024. Are you ready to Vote? Do you have a plan to Vote?

Per the <u>Florida Division of Elections</u>, voter turnout for the Primary Election was very low. The entire state of Florida had a **22%** voter turnout rate and Hillsborough County had a **19%** voter turnout rate. We have work to do!

Please get ready to vote by visiting <u>VOTE411.ORG</u>, which is a great resource for the upcoming election. You can:

- Check your registration and/or register to vote.
- Learn about early voting options.
- **Explore** your day of voting options know where to vote.
- **Research** the candidates and ballot initiatives.
- **Share** your plans with friends and family on what you have learned and encourage them to make a voting plan.

Important Dates for the upcoming General Election:

- General Election: November 5th
- Deadline to Register to Vote: October 7th
- Early Voting: October 21st November 3rd
- **Vote by mail request deadline:** October 24th (Florida law changed: a vote-by-mail ballot covers all elections from the date a request was submitted through the end of the calendar year for the next ensuing regularly scheduled general election.)
- Vote by mail ballots: Due, No Later Than 7 pm on Election Day, November 5th (please note the ballots must be returned and received by the supervisor of elections in your county of registration NOT Postmarked)

Ballot Measures - Florida

Amendment 1

This amendment, placed on the ballot by the state legislature, aims to require members of school boards to be elected in a partisan election rather than a nonpartisan election.

AAUW LORIDA: OPPOSES THIS BALLOT AMENDMENT!

Amendment 2

This amendment, placed on the ballot by the state legislature, aims to establish a constitutional right to hunt and fish in Florida and would make it the preferred means of responsibly managing and controlling fish and wildlife.

Amendment 3

This amendment, placed on the ballot by a citizens' initiative, aims to allow adults 21 years or older to possess, purchase, or use marijuana products and marijuana accessories for non-medical personal consumption.

Amendment 4

This amendment, placed on the ballot by a citizen's initiative, no law shall prohibit, penalize, delay, or restrict abortion before viability or when necessary to protect the patient's health, as determined by the patient's healthcare provider.

Amendment 5

This amendment, placed on the ballot by the state legislature, aims to increase the homestead exemption amount each
January 1, beginning 2025,
if the Consumer Price Index increases

Amendment 6

This amendment, placed on the ballot by the state legislature, aims to end Florida's public campaign financing program and spending limits for publicly funded candidates for Governor, Attorney General, Chief Financial Officer, and Commissioner of Agriculture. If the program is repealed, wealthy donors and Special interest groups would no longer be limited in the amounts they can contribute to these candidates.
