A STAR HAS FALLEN: REMEMBERING SHIRLEY "SHERRY" FOECKING"

Sherry Foecking joined AAUW Tampa in 1965, making her a 50-year-plus Lifetime Member! On July 24, 2023, Sherry passed away at the age of 100. She and a small group of long-term friends celebrated her birthday the week before she passed.

Sherry made a lasting positive impact on the AAUW Tampa branch in various roles over many years. When there was a job to do, Sherry stepped up to the plate with eagerness and a smile. She served as president or co-president of the branch six times. She was editor of the newsletter for twenty-five years. She spearheaded the writing of the branch's first bylaws. Additionally, she wrote short plays for holiday celebrations. And she never failed to enter a holiday ugly sweater or Colors Day contest. Sherry was a fierce competitor. However, you couldn't tell by her demeanor. She" dressed to win" and ended up taking home the top prize several times in both contests.

Why Teach Cursive in First Grade?

The question arises frequently: should first-grade students be taught printing or cursive writing? According to growing research, cursive provides clear advantages when it comes to early literacy development, writing fluency, and cognitive coordination.

One key study—Teaching of Cursive Writing in the First Year of Primary School: Effect on Reading and Writing Skills—was published in PLOS ONE in 2019 and provides compelling evidence in support of cursive instruction.

Grade I Writing Goals

The primary objective in first grade is to help children automate the production of letters and words. But which writing method best supports this goal—printing or cursive?

The Italian research study suggests cursive is the better choice. Let's explore why.

Key Findings from the 2019 Italian Study

This longitudinal study tracked 141 first-grade students across eight classrooms in southern Italy, divided into two groups:

Cursive-only group

Print & cursive group (taught simultaneously)

Students were assessed from September through May, and again the following November. All students were of similar socioeconomic background and had no cognitive or motor skill delays.

Results


Writing Fluency: The cursive-only group wrote 16 traphemes per minute, compared to 11 in the print & ursive group.

Spelling & Word Reading: Cursive-only students atperformed their peers in spelling and word recognion.

Fewer Errors: There were fewer reversals and transtition errors in the cursive-only group. Better Visual Word Processing: Cursive students showed a greater ability to process whole words using mental vocabulary, rather than letter-by-letter decoding.

Faster Reading Gains: Reading progress accelerated more rapidly in the cursive-only

Improved Letter Formation & Spelling: Greater advancements in both handwriting legibility and orthographic (spelling and sentence structure) accuracy were seen in the cursive-only group.



Several additional studies echo these findings: [37] Young children struggle more with *printed* writing patterns than with cursive.

[38] Printing requires frequent starts and stops, which rely on the cerebellum—a part of the brain that doesn't fully mature until age 16 and is vulnerable to developmental challenges.

In contrast, cursive engages cortical and subcortical brain regions that allow smoother, more integrated movement.

[35] A 2012 Canadian study found that students who learned only cursive (compared to those taught print or a print-then-cursive sequence) performed better in spelling and grammar.

[52] An Indiana State University study also showed higher achievement in spelling and word reading among first-grade students taught cursive exclusively.

Additional research ([30, 53, 54]) continues to support these outcomes.

Conclusion

The evidence is clear: teaching cursive in first grade not only supports writing fluency but also strengthens reading, spelling, and cognitive development. Continuous, flowing movements in cursive writing align better with young children's physiological and neurological development—making it the optimal method for building foundational literacy skills.
